Their chapter has continued to grow and remain very active with members from all walks of life. Chi Epsilon, Wichita

Chi Epsilon Chapter was chartered in November 1980. The chapter's projects, at the time, were the Blarney Breakfast and Santa's House; both projects reflecting the chapter's mission of helping children with special needs. The life of Chi Epsilon still speaks as they continue to host the Blarney Breakfast to benefit Rainbows United thirty years later. The chapter has 22 members, one being a charter member: Margaret Shook. Over the years Chi Epsilon has earned the honor of being awarded outstanding chapter and has three members whom have served as President of the Kansas State Council: Margaret Shook, Helen Stitt, and Karen Knorp-Brown. The chapter enthusiastically supports all international, state, and district projects as well as local charities such as the Alzheimer's Association, Shasta House, and Multiple Sclerosis.

50 YEARS

Eta Phi, Wichita

Eta Phi was chartered in February, 1961, by Pat McMillan. Although not a charter member, Joan Bourn, past International Council President, joined Eta Phi the following year and has been a member of ESA and Eta Phi for over 50 years. Charmaine Nichols is also a long time member of Eta Phi having served over 40 years. Eta Phi has always been active at the district and state levels. Many of their members have served or continue to serve on the Kansas State Council including two past State Council Presidents and eight past Zone/District chairs. Crystal Collinworth is the current State Auditor and 2011-2012 treasurer, while Ann Merrett will serve a second term as District D

Chair next year. They are always proud to call Joy Thornbrugh an honorary member, as she was part of Eta Phi for a number of years before moving from Wichita. Eta Phi supports all international and state philanthropic projects as well as numerous chapter projects, consistently placing in the top ten chapters in the state. The friendships they have made in ESA, on all levels, continue to be a source of inspiration to continue their commitment of serving ESA. They will continue to support all levels of their sorority and will keep dedicating themselves anew to the vows they all made when joining ESA and Eta Phi. They feel there is no other organization in the world that allows everyone to do their part in serving those less fortunate and to make lasting and enduring friendships.

65 YEARS

Beta Zeta, Topeka

The Beta Zeta chapter, from Topeka, was chartered in August of 1946, with three members. An International representative was sent to help organize the chapter after being contacted by Beryle Elliott. Beta Zeta gradually pledged more members, but because they were all young with some being married to servicemen, there was a continual turnover. They managed to maintain a steady membership of about fifteen members until the 1970's with twenty-three members strong. In the earlier years, when the treasury was low on funds, they sold greeting and Christmas cards. They have had a number of their members who have served on the State Council and as Zone and District officers. All current members have served in all of their chapter offices. Presently, the chapter is made up of nine members. One of their members recently moved out of town, and they have lost two members to death in the last six months. They continue to meet regularly and have a lesson each month. Their Sisterhood is something they value. Beta Zeta plans to continue to "Let Their Life Speak" by staying active with Epsilon Sigma Alpha and within their local community.
